

- Equip its students with the highest sense of ethics, social responsibility and good citizenship.





Research




Low Student-Faculty Ratio

Faculty advisors assist students with course selection and other academic matters. To facilitate close interaction between students and faculty, the overall student/faculty ratio of the university has been established at an average of ten to one.

English Instruction

Since the medium of instruction at Koç University is English, students who are not proficient in the English language are required to enroll in the language program offered by the Koç University English Language Center (ELC). Upon successful completion of the program, they are admitted to the Freshman class. Undergraduate students can also select a second foreign language of their choice. At present, available options are French, German, Spanish, Russian, Italian and Arabic.



Academic Terminology & Know-How

Even-though exchange students are with us for only one or two semesters, KU embraces these students as their own and provides them with all the resources and opportunities available to regular KU students. This, of course, also means that KU exchange students are subject to the same rules and regulations as our regular students.

Course Load, ECTS & KU Credits

Course load indicates how many credits you study in a semester. KU students typically take five courses per term for an average of 15 KU credits (which is equal to 30 ECTS). Although there is no requirement for exchange students, at least three courses are recommended. It is ultimately up to your home institution to approve your course load.

Prerequisite

Some intermediate and advanced courses will require introductory study in that subject. In that case, the course instructor or your advisor will look for such prerequisites in your previous studies. Should you wish to take a class without the required prerequisites, you can speak to the instructor for special permission.

Independent Study

KU offers independent study as a way for students to earn credit for specialized projects. These projects can take the form of research, experiential learning, etc. To receive permission for independent study projects, students must first get in contact with, and ensure the support of, a KU faculty member.



Withdrawal


If you find a course different or more difficult than you expected, or if your home institution does not approve the course content, you have the option to withdraw from that course without penalties, provided that you complete withdrawal procedures by the deadline stated on the academic calendar (see p. 16). If you want to withdraw from a course, you need to contact your advisor for the procedures and his/her approval. If you fail to follow these procedures, then you are technically still enrolled in the course and will therefore receive an F.

Late Withdrawal

If, for a valid reason, you have missed the regular withdrawal date, then you may write a request addressed to the Academic Provost to withdraw from a given course. You may contact the KU Exchange Team for information, but keep in mind that late withdrawal approvals are rare and highly exceptional.

Rules

Attendance and academic honesty are of utmost value at KU. Please be aware of course requirements on the syllabi, and be sure to carefully read the official rules and regulations of KU at http://rules.ku.edu.tr.







Mentors & Academic Advisors

Student Mentors

Upon your arrival to Koc University, you will be assigned a Student Mentor to help you with your adaptation to life in Turkey. KU selects mentors based on the breadth of their international exposure, level of responsibility and prior experience, ensuring that top-notch KU students are interfacing with and guiding incoming exchange students. Your mentor helps you with the technicalities of matriculation at KU and serves as a key contact point on and off campus. Among other things, mentors guide you through registration, introduce you to the campus facilities, and teach you how to use KU's various student support services. Your mentor will be available to you throughout your stay. We encourage exchange students to fully engage their mentors and be open to exploring social and cultural immersion activities as well.

Academic Advisors

In addition to a mentor, you will also be assigned an academic advisor to assist you in course selection and all related academic support. Your academic advisor is crucial to you: in order to register for courses or withdraw from them, you need his/her approval signature. Your academic advisor can also serve as a liaison between you and other faculty members and academic opportunities on campus, including research positions and special programs/projects. You may also contact the Dean's Office for course-related questions. Relevant phone numbers are listed under the "Important Contacts on Campus" section of this handbook (see p. 84-85).

Registration Information

Registration

Before you arrive at KU, the Office of International Programs will have already sent you a KU Student ID number and password in order to complete the online pre-registration and dorm application. Whether official registration for classes opens before or after your arrival to our campus, the KU Office of International Programs will notify you. Once official registration is opened, you will go back into the KUAIS system (the same one you used for pre-registration and dorm app) to complete the registration procedure.

KUAIS (Koc University Academic Information System)

KUAIS is the university's online student services portal used for official course registration, other academic information, viewing your and faculty members' schedules, career services, and access to academic & activity calendars. Your KUAIS account will be active after your registration.

Registration Procedures

Pre-Registration

You have pre-registered to the courses before arriving. Though pre-registration is only a tentative course selection that helps KU creating course sizes and timetables, it is the first official step for registering the courses. As long as the courses you pre-registered are opened and have capacities, you automically register to these courses by logging on to your KUAIS, checking your schedule and accepting it during official registration period.

Official Registration

Official Registration takes place the week before classes start. The steps you follow for official registration:

- 1- Log into KUAIS to register for courses.
- 2- Check your schedule, capacities and your status (check if you are on any waiting list or not)
- 3- If, you are not in the waiting list and your schedule is as you would like it to be, click on "Accept" to complete the registration process
- 4- However, there are some components of the registration process to consider:
 - a) Pre-requisities
 - ♠ Exchange students are only notified about the existence of any relevant prerequisites -you do not have to do anything extra to sign up for these courses
 - → However, we are available to review pre-requisites if you wish- you should contact OIP
 - b) Professor approval
 - Some courses require professor approval. Students are allowed to sign up for these classes but must secure professor signatures during add/drop days (explained below).
 - c) Waiting list
 - → Some courses will have a waiting list for sign ups over course capacity
 - Students can sign up for these courses but then must check KUAIS regularly to adjust their course program according to waiting list activity
 - Students cannot sign up for more than 5 courses, so being on a wait-listed course means using one of your "spaces" for that course
 - → For that reason, if you do not get into a class from the wait list you can fill these open slots with new courses during the add/drop period.
 - And, for that reason, regularly checking your KUAIS during registration period is highly recommended.

 - all waiting lists are cleared at the beginning of the add/drop period.



Add / Drop

In the first week of every semester (after official registration is complete), you have the ability to add and/or drop classes to your schedule.

Please note that Add/Drop is totally different from Withdrawing. If you withdraw from a course, that course is printed on your transcript as a "Withdrawal", however this course does not affect your GPA. If you drop a course, you completely erase that course from your schedule.

The most important difference between the official registration and add/drop period is that ALL WAITING LISTS ARE CLEARED for Add/Drop and your course schedule is finalized.

The Add/Drop process can run in two ways:

On the computer:

- 1- Log on to KUAIS
- 2- Make changes
- 3- Take print out of the final course selection
- 4- Get approval signature from Advisor
- 5- Submit the form to Registrar's Office (to Ms. Burcu Selçuk)

On paper:

- 1- Add/drop forms are inserted in the welcome package. If you cannot find your add/drop form you can obtain a copy from OIP
- 2- You should add/drop the courses you want to take (different than the courses officially registered via KUAIS
- 3- Get a signature from your advisor
- 4- Once you complete the tasks above, submit the form to the Registrar's Office.

Your mentor will assist you during the registration and add/drop process.



Technical Services

IT Services

For all technical services, you may obtain detailed information by visiting CIT page through KU home page (the "FAQ" link on the top menu has a lot of useful information). We recommend you to read STUDENT HANDBOOK (EN) on the main page of CIT. A brief description of KU's technical services is included below. You may obtain your user name and password (used for all KU-related networks and online services) from the following web site: password.ku.edu.tr. Please change your password using at least five characters. Please note that the website will only be open on registration days (in the first two weeks of the semester).

E-mail Account

The format of your KU-mail will be username@ku.edu.tr and is accessed at http://my.ku.edu.tr.

Your user name is generally the first letter of your first name followed by your last name. For John Smith, the e-mail address will be jsmith@ku.edu.tr. Faculty and administration keep in contact with students through KUmail; It is absolutely essential that you check your KUmail regularly.

Smart ID:

Smart ID is the KU student card that you can use for entering Campus and borrowing

books from Suna Kıraç Library. If you prefer Smart ID, KU offers you additional card that you can use for photocopying and scaninng.

Printing

- The first 500 pages that you print during your time at KU are free. After these "freebies," you pay for your printing needs.

Photocopy And Scanner Services

Photocopy machines are avalable 24/7 at the Student Center and between 08:30 and 17:00 at the Xerox Center on Floor -2 in the student center.

Scanner machines are available 24/7 at the College of Engineering Building, Floor -1, across from Rooms B19 and B20 and at the library.

Telephone And Mobile Phone Systems

Telephone System:

Phone services within campus are free of charge. You may receive outside calls to your room. Callers should dial: +90 212 338 _ _ _ (your 4-digit extension). When making a call within campus, just dial the last 4 digits. To obtain the extension number for your dorm room, please call the housing department at ext. 3777.

Outside Calls:

If you want to make outside calls from your dorm room, you should contact the Dormitory Office to obtain an access code. Based on your needs, you make one of the following deposits to the Yapı Kredi Bank USD account (#00540749): for local calls (İstanbul), 100 USD; for long distance, 250 USD; for international, 500 USD. If you are calling an outside number from a campus phone, please be sure to dial 9 first. Your phone bills will be on the web at phone.ku.edu.tr.

Reaching the Right Number:

İstanbul is divided into two area codes: 0 212 (European side) / 0 216 (Asian side).

- To call a number on the same side of İstanbul, dial only the seven-digit number. To call the other side, you must dial the appropriate area code as well.
- For international calls, dial 00 followed by the country code.

Mobile Phone:

How To Obtain A Mobile Phone In Turkey: Students wishing to use mobile phones in Turkey must first decide if they want to use the mobile phone service provider from their home country or establish service with a local provider. It is very costly and problematic to use your home country mobile service, so we encourage you to find a local provider for your mobile phone

needs. Your mentors will assist you in this process.

There are three mobile phone operators in Turkey: Avea. Vodafone and Turkcell. Service by these operators is offered in two forms: prepaid minutes and monthly billing services.

If you are going to use a local provider, you will also need to buy a mobile phone from Turkey: if you put a Turkish SIM card in an international phone, the phone will stop working within a few days.

Students mostly use Turkcell prepaid services and purchase their mobile phones from Turkcell stores. It is typically cheaper and more convenient. When going to buy your local mobile phone, do not forget to take your passport with you, as the provider will ask for a copy.

How To Set Up Your Internet In Your Dorm Room

To set up Internet in your room, you should follow the procedures outlined at the following link: http://ku.edu.tr \rightarrow CIT \rightarrow "Services" → "Network Services" → "Internet

On this page, you will be instructed to install SUS (Microsoft Software Update Services), McAfee antivirus program, and other software necessary to protect your computer. Please be aware that these instructions are for NT-based operating systems (Win2000. WinXP, etc.).

If you have any questions or problems, please call Dormitory Support Services (DSS) at ext. 4455 or send an e-mail to dss@ku.edu.tr. DSS is located at S Dorm building and available Monday through Friday and Sunday from 11:30 to 20:00.



Residence Permit

You need to apply for a Residence Permit as soon as you arrive on campus—according to Turkish Government regulations, applications must be submitted within the first month of your arrival to Turkey.

The Office of International Programs and Mr. Ayhan Şeker in the Office of External Relations will assist you in obtaining a Residence Permit.

You are asked to prepare the following documents and submit them to the Office of International Programs:

- 4 recent photographs with your name on the back
- Your passport
- 149 TL (Spring 2011)
- Completed "Residence Permit Declaration Form" (you have already done this prior to your arrival)
- "Öğrenci Belgesi"/"Student Document" (Office of International Programs prepares this for you)

Applications are ultimately submitted to the Police Department for Foreigners in İstanbul (Yabancılar Emniyet Müdürlüğü). Mr. Şeker will schedule a trip to the Police Department for Foreigners on the date of availability and take you, as a group, to the police station. It is mandatory that you go with Mr. Şeker to obtain your permit.

Note: If you fail to depart Turkey by the expiration date on the residence permit document, you will have to pay a penalty and will not be admitted back to the country for three months.

Opening A Bank Account At Yapı Kredi Bank On Campus

Banks throughout the country offer full foreign currency and TL services, including deposits and saving accounts, credit cards, debit cards and fast money transfer to any bank in the world. You can process your banking transactions via the Internet or use the telephone banking option, both of which are designed to serve in English.

Banks will exchange foreign currency but will charge a commission in order to do so. Please do not bring travelers cheques, bank checks or Eurocheques, as they are problematic to cash.

The major full service banks have branches in almost every district. At Koc University, we have a full service bank, Yapı Kredi Bank, located on Floor -1 of the Student Center.

If you decide to open a bank account, you will need a Tax ID and passport in order to do so. Office of International Programs will provide you with a Tax ID.

Accommodation

Students' housing applications are processed by the Dormitory Management, who is solely responsible for all matters pertaining to housing, including placement decisions.

The standard placement for exchange students is a double-occupancy rooms with a Turkish roommate. However, you are given several choices regarding dormitory arrangements prior to your arrival at KU.

Exchange students will be informed of the specifics of their housing placements only after arrival at KU.

If you are staying on campus, you must pay your dorm fee and deposit within one week of your arrival, or you will be locked out of your dorm room.

Each floor of each dormitory building has a Resident Assistant (RÅ) that lives on that floor. Their duty is to support dorm residents in need and to ensure a peaceful and tolerable environment for all. Please contact the RA of your building to be informed of the dormitory rules. Your RA is always available to answer your questions.

After arriving on campus, you have exactly one month to make changes to your housing arrangements.

Students can use their credit cards to pay for the dorm. Make sure the credit card limit covers the fee.

Heating, cleaning services and the use of recreation areas are included in fees. There can be no exceptions to this rule, unless the student checks out on a weekend. Please note that your deposit will be paid in Turkish Liras. 


Dormitory Facilities

Main Campus Dormitory Facilities:

- Double-occupancy, single and quadruple rooms are available.
- · Each dorm room has a refrigerator, bed, closet, desk, chair, bed stand, light, pillow and duvet.
- Students should bring their own towel, pillow case, sheets and duvet covers.
- In regular dorm buildings, 7 to 10 students living on the same floor share a bathroom.

Main Campus

The Main Campus consists of sixty buildings-academic colleges, administrative offices, laboratories, library, student dorms, faculty residences, social and sports facilities-all located on a sprawling 62-acre estate.

- The Suna Kıraç Library spans over 8,000 square meters, circulates approximately 5,500 items per month and houses over 300.000 resources.
- Indoor sports facilities include a multipurpose center used for basketball, tennis, volleyball, badminton, handball, squash and racquetball, a two-floor fitness center, an aerobics step studio and a 156-meter jogging track.
- Outdoor sports facilities include an olympic-size soccer field, swimming pool, ice skating rink, tennis courts and a basketball court.
- The 370-seat Sevgi Gönül Auditorium and 310-seat Engineering Auditorium are used for cultural activities and art events throughout the year.
- Other facilities include cafeterias, canteens, cafes, full- service bank, ATM machines, supermarket, dry cleaning, bookstore, post office and 24-hour computer labs (computer lab locations: ENG B19 / B20 / 128 / Z21; SOS 180; CAS Z16 ELC Lab).

West Campus

West campus is located 2 kilometers west of the Main Campus and consists of dorms and related facilities.

- The main facilities include an indoor swimming-pool, sports center, dance hall, post office, storage room and play stations.
- Other facilities include a snack bar, cafeteria, darts, computer lab and free laptops in each dorm building.

Regularly scheduled shuttles are run to and from the Main Campus. Schedules are customized to the needs of the students living on the West Campus each semester.














Suna Kıraç Library

With its central location on campus, the Suna Kıraç Library has an exemplary collection of books, journals, newspapers, electronic resources, DVDs and materials in other media. Coverage is international in scope and comprehensive in subject matter. The library holds around 300,000 materials in the areas of Arts & Humanities. Business & Economics, General Reference, Science & Engineering, Nursing, Law, and Social Science. Also, Suna Kıraç Library subscribes to over 60,000 electronic journals and 266 print journals. Publications in Turkish, English, French, German and Italian are routinely acquired. There are also two 24-hour study halls with separate outside entrances. Semahat Arsel Sports Center & Recreation

The Semahat Arsel Sports Center is a multipurpose building with a capacity of 2000 spectators and a 1500 m2 main hall used for basketball, tennis, volleyball and handball. Additionally, there are squash and racquetball courts, a two-floor fitness center and an aerobics-step studio. Students may pursue personal health objectives under trained supervision as well as participate in the organized sport services provided. Exchange students are welcome to join team sports.

National Anthem: "İstiklal Marşı" (Independence March)

Government: Turkey is a democratic, secular and social state governed by code of law, committed to the nationalism of Atatürk and separated into Legislative, Judicial and Executive branches.

Coastline: Turkey is surrounded by sea on three sides: the Black Sea in the North, the Mediterranean in the south and the Aegean Sea in the West. In the Northwest, the Sea of Marmara sits between the Dardanelles and Bosporus straits.

Domestic Products: Turkey is among the global leaders in textile, leather and readyto-wear clothing production. As of 2000, Turkey is first in the world in terms of hardshell nuts, fig and apricot production; fourth in fresh vegetables, grape and tobacco production; and seventh in wheat and cotton production. Turkish Delight and Helva are famous throughout the world. High-quality handmade Turkish carpets are also one of the main export items of Turkey. The most famous and finest pure silk carpets of the world are produced in the small town of Hereke, 60 km east of Istanbul.

Time: For all of Turkey, local time is equal to GMT + 2 hours.

Electricity: 220 volts AC

Weights And Measures: Metric and kilo system





Famous Turks

Mustafa Kemal Atatürk (1881-1938) is universally acknowledged as the founding father of the modern state of Turkey and served as the country's first official President. He was a visionary statesman and a military leader par excellence. His surname, Atatürk, means "the ancestor of Turks." This name was given to him by the first Turkish parliament for his accomplishments and for his invaluable contributions to the birth and modernization of the Turkish Republic.





Mimar Sinan (1490-1588) was the frontrunner among the architects of the Ottoman Era. He was the Chief Architect to many a Sultan. His numerous creations that dot the Turkish skyline still evoke wonder and appreciation and many of the architectural trends he set are still pervasive today. Selimiye Mosque (Edirne) and Süleymaniye Mosque (İstanbul) are among his world famous works.

Hezarfan Ahmet Çelebi (1609-1640), an inhabitant of İstanbul in the 17th century Ottoman Empire, is credited with the first human flight in the history of aviation via artificial wings. The event took place in 1638 when Hezarfen took off from the 183-foot tall Galata Tower on the European side of İstanbul and landed successfully at Üsküdar on the Asian side.



Orhan Pamuk (1952-) is one of the most talented and renowned writers in today's world of literature. Pamuk has won many awards and was even considered for the Nobel Prize Award in Literature in 2005. His original and rich writing style, as well as intellectually stimulating ideas, make him a best-selling author in Turkey and abroad.



Elif Şafak (1971-) is the most-read female author in Turkey, where she is as well known for her descriptions of backstreets Istanbul as she is for her global and multicultural perspective. Her writing is at once rooted in her politically feminist education and her deep respect for and knowledge of Sufism and Ottoman culture

Ahmet Ertegün (1923-2006) was the Turkish-American founder and President of Atlantic Records, which is one of the top purveyors of pop music in the US, including world renowned artists and groups such as Björk , Led Zeppelin, Sean Paul and Toni Braxton.





Dr. Mehmet Öz (1960-) is a Turkish-American cardiothoracic surgeon and author. In 1982, he received his undergraduate degree from Harvard University. In 1986, he obtained a joint MD and MBA degree from the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine and The Wharton School of Business. Dr. Öz is one of the most influential voices in medicine today. having appeared on Oprah and several other internationally televised programs. Time magazine ranked Dr. Öz 44th on its list of the 100 Most Influential People in 2008, and Esquire magazine placed him on its list of the 75 Most Influential People of the 21st Century. He was called a Global Leader

of Tomorrow by the World Economic Forum and one of "The Harvard 100 Most Influential Alumni" by 02138 magazine. He was listed in "Doctors of the Year" by Hippocrates magazine and in "Healers of the Millennium" by Healthy Living magazine.

Nuri Bilge Ceylan (1959-)is a Turkish film director and photographer. Cevlan's first short film Koza (Cocoon) debuted at the 1995 Cannes Film Festival. He received many awards with his debut feature Kasaba (Small Town). His third feature Uzak (Distant) also received many international accolades, including the Grand Jury Prize and the Best Actor Prize at Cannes. His 2006 film Iklimler (Climates) won the FIPRESCI Movie Critics' Award at the 2006 Cannes Film Festival and received international praise by critics and experts. The film won 5 awards at the 2006 Antalya Golden Orange Film Festival, bringing him the Best Director title. He again received



recognition at the Cannes Film Festival in 2008, with a Best Director award for his film entitled Üç Maymun (Three Monkeys).

İstanbul

İstanbul is the largest city in Turkey and 5th largest city in the world. It is truly a "megacity" that serves as the cultural, economic, and financial center of Turkey. İstanbul is located on the Bosporus Strait and encompasses the natural harbor known as the "Golden Horn." It extends both on the European (Thrace) and on the Asian (Anatolia) sides of the Bosporus and is therefore the only metropolis in the world that is situated on two continents. İstanbul is a designated alpha world city. In its long history, İstanbul has served as the capital city of the Roman Empire (330-395), the Eastern Roman (Byzantine) Empire (395-1204 and 1261-1453), the Latin Empire (1204-1261), and the Ottoman Empire (1453-1922). Historic areas of İstanbul were added to the UNESCO World Heritage List in 1985, and the city was chosen as joint European Capital of Culture for 2010.

İstanbul maintains a distinguished position among the metropolises of the world with its unique geographical location and a cultural heritage of thousands of years. As one of the most energetic cities in the world, Istanbul has a thriving tourism sector that attracts millions of foreigners each year.

The 2010 European Capital of Culture recognition has engendered renewed activity in the preservation and proliferation of Turkey's multi-dimensional and incredibly rich cultural heritage.

Many people invested in the global elevation of culture and arts, together with members of the print and visual media, have come to Istanbul from around the world to visit and contribute to the city's cultural riches. This influx has established a lasting and positive international recognition of Istanbul's inherent value, boosting the city's relations with Europe and beyond.

İstanbul has achieved lasting gains in the fields of urban renewal, urban living and environmental and social development. New museums have been established to protect and display Turkey's cultural assets; and historical buildings have been renovated, given new roles and opened to the public. Citizens are embracing new artistic disciplines. Young talented people have the opportunity to become more closely involved in artistic creativity. Jobs have been created for a large number of people in the fields of cross-cultural communication and organization, education, design, management and creative arts.

With the renovations that have taken place, the administrators and the administered have joined together, hand in hand, to share their knowledge and experience in a collective effort to develop a long-term sustainable model for the future.







Gastronomy

Turkish cuisine is world renowned. Restaurants work hard to preserve the centuriesold legacy of delicious recipes made with fresh ingredients and a variety of exotic spices. Waiters will help you choose what to eat, and regional specialties abound.

Turkish cuisine was popularized by the Ottoman Empire in Eastern Europe and throughout the Middle East. Many common recipes reveal Turkish influences, including yogurt salads, fish in olive oil, stuffed vegetables and vine leaves, and syrupy filo dough desserts. Newly baked bread is a staple, and lamb and chicken are the main meats. Pork is forbidden by Islam and hence not common. Seasonal vegetables and fruits, including eggplants, peaches, figs, olives, dried apricots, as well as all kinds of nuts, are very popular. Pilavs (flavoured, spiced rice), pirzola (thin-cut lamb chops which are seasoned with sumac, thyme, and quickly grilled), sucuk (a spicy sausage), pasturma (sun-dried, cumin-coated, preserved beef), şiş kebap (roasted meat on skewers), and sütlaç (milk pudding) are Turkish specialties.

The traditional Turkish drink is Rakı, an alcoholic drink made from different fruits. Rakı is usually consumed with cold appetizer dishes, such as tomatoes, cucumber, lettuce, cheese, melon and seafood. Ayran, a yogurt drink made by diluting yogurt with water, is also very refreshing.

Both coffee and tea play an integral role in Turkey's social life. Tea and coffee houses are social hubs, where news and gossip are exchanged. Turks prepare tea using a double tea pot and drink it in clear, tulip-shaped glasses. Turkish coffee is served hot from a special coffee pot called cezve.



Transportation

Local transportation is surprisingly cheap in Turkey. The price of a one-way ticket, depending on the type of transportation, is between one and three Turkish Liras.





Koç-Sarıyer Dolmuş

Every ten minutes, the dolmuş (or minibus) runs from the KU campus to downtown Sarıyer. Campus Departure Point: Between the Main Campus dormitories and the Sports Center Sarıyer Departure Point: Opposite to the Cultural Center (near the main bus stop)

From Sariyer, first departure is at 8:00; last departure is at 23:00

Sarıyer-Metro-Beşiktaş Dolmuş

Every five minutes, the dolmuş runs from Sarıyer to Beşiktaş. They have a yellow signboard. If you want to go to one of the metro stations (Except Mecidiyeköy, Osmanbey and Taksim Metro Stations), you should take this Dolmuş.

Sarıyer-Kilyos Dolmuş

Every twenty minutes, the dolmuş runs from Sariyer to Kilyos. You can take this dolmuş if you want to go to the beach clubs on the coast of Black Sea. Sariyer Departure Point: Twenty meters behind the Koç-Sariyer dolmuş

*If you want to take this dolmuş without going to Sariyer, first you have to take the

dolmuş from Koç University to "Acarlar Ön Kapı." For the first couple of times, ask the driver to let you know when you are there. Then, at Acarlar, you wait for the Kilyos dolmuş to come.

Taxi Service

You may call Marti Taxi at (212) 341 1184. Your destination should be told to the driver in advance. The taximeter should start at departure from campus. You may get assistance from the main entrance (ext. 3535) for calling a taxi service.

Akbil (Rechargeable Token) Purchase

It is advised that you purchase an "Akbil" at the main bus stop in Sariyer, "İETT Hareket Amirli_i." Akbil is a discounted token system that works for all types of local transportation provided by the metropolitan municipality, including the Metro, Otobüs (bus), Deniz Otobüsü (sea bus) and Vapur (ferry). It is significantly cheaper to purchase an Akbil than to pay each time for local transportation services.

The distance from Atatürk Airport to KU campus is about 45 km and costs around 60 TL (\$40) by taxi. Sabiha Gökçen Airport is a bit further: a taxi from there to KU costs 100 TL (\$66).

Weather

Due to its size, topography and maritime influences, İstanbul exhibits a multitude of distinct microclimates. According to the Köppen climate classification system, İstanbul has a Mediterranean climate, but its climate becomes more Marine toward the Northwest

Summers are generally hot and partially dry, with the temperature averaging $23.4 \,^{\circ}\text{C}$ (74.1 $^{\circ}\text{F}$).

Winters are cold, wet and often snowy, averaging 5.4 °C (42 °F).

Spring and Autumn are usually mild, and the weather can range from chilly to warm.

Snowfall is common between the months of December and March, sometimes with a week or two of snow cover; but average winter snowfall often varies considerably, and snow cover usually remains only for a few days after each snowfall.



Sightseeing in İstanbul

Rumelian Castle/Rumeli Hisarı, Sarıyer: The "Rumelian Castle" is a fortress located in Sarıyer. It was built by the Ottoman Sultan Mehmed II between 1451 and 1452, before he conquered Constantinople.

Haghia Sophia/Ayasofya, Sultanahmet Square: The Church of Holy Wisdom, undoubtedly one of the greatest architectural creations in the world, was built by the Byzantine Emperor Justinian



circa 535 AD. It was transformed into a mosque after the Ottoman conquest of the city in 1453. Now a museum, it contains beautifully preserved Byzantine mosaics.

Basilica Cistern/Yerebatan Sarnıcı, Sultanahmet Square: The awesome columned cavern was the water source for both the Grand Palace of the Byzantines and for the Ottomans' Topkapı Palace.

Topkapi Palace/Topkapi Sarayi, Sultanahmet: The legendary palace of the Ottoman sultans from the 15th - 19th centuries. With low buildings set in a series of courtyards, Topkapi Palace is quite unlike its western counterparts. Be sure to see the Harem and the Treasury.

The Bosporus/Boğaziçi: The straits which divide Europe from Asia and define İstanbul. By joining a cruise up and down its shores, you will see Imperial palaces, which are interspersed with wooden seaside mansions, decorative ferry landings, the twin fortresses of Rumeli Hisar and Anadolu Hisar, and two intercontinental bridges.

The Grand Bazaar/Kapalı Çarşı, Beyazıt: The Grand Bazaar is spread over 30,700 square meters with 65 streets & alleys and 4000 shops. It was completed in 1481 after Mehmet II captured the city. The selection of shops includes jewelry, carpets, leather, ceramics, copper and brass objects, embroider- ies. You will also find nice cafés there. Be sure to bargain aggressively with store owners!



Egyptian Bazaar/Mısır Çarşısı, Eminönü: An exotic food market and bazaar, selling spices, dried fruits, cheeses, olives, as well as towels, slippers, baskets and some jewelry.


Galata Tower/Galata Kulesi. Sishane: The Galata Tower is one of İstanbul's most striking landmarks. The original tower was destroyed during the Fourth Crusade, but it was rebuilt as the Tower of Christ in 1348 during an expansion of the Genoese colony in Constantinople. The tower was rebuilt several times during the Ottoman period. In the 1960s the original wooden interior of the tower was replaced by a concrete structure and was opened to the public. There is a modern restaurant and cafe on its upper floors with a magnificent view of İstanbul and the Bosporus.

Blue Mosque/Sultanahmet Cami, Sultanahmet Square: Built in the early 17th century, it is the most famous mosque in the city. It is distinguished by six minarets and walls covered with amazing blue İznik tiles.

Süleymaniye Mosque/Süleymaniye Cami, Beyazıt: Mimar Sinan's masterpiece. The massive scale of this mosque is best appreciated from a distance.











Dolmabahçe Palace/Dolmabahçe Sarayı, Beşiktaş: Located right on the Bosporus on the European side of the city, the palace was built by architects Karabet and Nikagos Baylan for Sultan Abdulmecid. The sultan preferred a modern residence and moved here from Topkapı Palace when it was finished in 1853. This palace was the imperial residence of subsequent Ottoman Sultans. It was also the residence of the founder of the Turkish Republic, Mustafa Kemal Atatürk.


Taksim Square/Taksim Merkezi, Beyoğlu: Taksim is the heartbeat of İstanbul nightlife and a main tourist attraction during the day. Closed off to most traffic. Taksim is wall-to-wall restaurants, stores, bars, specialty shops and more. Be sure to check out the Tunnel (Tünel).

Bevlerbevi Palace/Bevlerbevi Saravi, Bevlerbevi: This palace is located right on the Bosporus coast on the Asian side of the city. It was built by architect Sarkis Balyan who was the brother of the architect who built Dolmabahce Palace. It was built in 1861-65 for Sultan Abdülaziz





Exchanging Money

Foreign currency exchange offices ("döviz") offer fast service outside of normal banking hours and typically have better rates than banks or hotels. They do not charge commission and only change foreign cash currency. Passports are not required.

Banks exchange foreign currency with a service fee of 1-3% of the total transaction commissions. Banks are usually open between 09:30-12:00 and 13:30-17:00 on weekdays. They are closed on the weekends.






